Offense: Wanted Person

Date: 05.03.15

Time: 1947 hours

Location: 15700 blk San Pedro

An officer observed a vehicle parked in an isolated section of the parking lot of local gym. The vehicle was the only vehicle in the parking lot. As the officer drove by the vehicle, he noticed that the driver's door was ajar. The officer stopped and ran the license plate through the computer and approached the vehicle. As he got to the driver's door, he noticed a male subject asleep in the driver's seat. The officer made contact with the driver to ensure he was alright. The driver seems really nervous and the reason he gave for being parked at that location seemed suspicious. When asked for identification, the subject stated that he did not have his license on him but provided a name and date of birth. The male could not provide his address and was unsure of the street name. The officer returned to the vehicle and ran the name and date of birth through the computer and received a return with both his name and his brother's name. Each had Bexar County numbers with pictures attached. The name provided initially by the male did not match the picture but the name of other did. The male had a Bexar County Warrant for DWI, 2nd Offense and four (4) San Antonio Municipal Warrants attached. The officer requested assistance from HPPD, who responded. Contact was made with Bexar County ID Verification section who verified the DWI warrant as valid. Upon arrival of HPPD, the officer made contact with the male who confirmed his real first name. The male was taken into custody. The vehicle was inventoried and impounded. A black nylon laptop case containing, a Toshiba laptop, a broken HP tablet, two cell phones, and various other items was removed from the vehicle for safekeeping prior to being impounded. Items were listed on a HCVPD Property Inventory sheet and placed in the property room for storage. The male was transported and booked into the Magistrate's Office.

Offense: Assist other Agency**Date: 05.06.15****Time: 1905 hours****Location: US 281 N @ Nakoma**

An officer assisted the Bexar County Sheriff's Office by detaining a suspect vehicle involved in an assault. At approximately 1852hrs, the Bexar County Dispatcher had announced an assault had occurred at an address on Wilderness Oak. The suspects involved fled the scene in a Mercedes describe as gray in color and displaying the license plate number of #####. Due to the officer's proximity of the incident location, the officer positioned his patrol car in the 15700 block of San Pedro Ave where he had a clear and unobstructed view of the southbound traffic on US 281 N. On or at the approximate time of 1904hrs, the officer observed a gray Mercedes traveling southbound on US 281 in what appeared to be a speed faster than the regular pace of traffic. The officer proceeded onto US 281 and began to close the distance between the suspect vehicle and his patrol car. During that time, the officer observed the gray Mercedes's brake lights illuminating as it slowed to a pace in conjunction with the vehicles traveling alongside. The officer was unable to lock in the speed of travel with radar before the suspect vehicle had reduced its speed. The officer estimated the speed of 75mph in a 65mph zone. Once the gray Mercedes became discernable, the officer observed it was being occupied by three males and the vehicle displayed the license plate of #####. Although one of the license plates characters differed from the one originated reported by the victim, the officer found it reasonable to believe that license plate ##### could have been mistaken for #####. Due to the reasonable time lapse, the proximity of the vehicle that reasonable matched the description given, and by witnessing the suspect vehicle speeding, a vehicle stop was conducted. The officer informed Bexar County dispatcher that he was out with their suspect vehicle and additional units were assigned to assist. The suspect vehicle came to a complete stop at US 281 and E Nakoma. Once contact was made, the officer asked the driver why he was speeding. The driver stated "yeah, I know I was going too fast, and I slowed when I seen you". The officer obtained the driver's identification and had him step out of the vehicle. The driver complied and was escorted to the rear of the vehicle where a consent to search was obtained and then performed. While obtaining the identification of the remaining occupants, other officers arrived on scene to assist. Approximately 10 minutes later a deputy arrived at the location and detained the suspect's for further investigation. The HCV officer assisted until no longer needed.

Offense: Burglary of a Habitation**Date: 05.08.15****Time: 0725 hours****Location: 100 blk South Tower Drive**

An officer was dispatched to a residence for a burglary of a habitation call. The officer made contact with the resident who reported the following. On 5-7-2015 at approximately 0800 hours, the resident noticed one of his garage doors was partially open. Thinking his fiancé left it open, he closed it thinking nothing more of it. Later that evening at approximately 2300 hours, the resident went out to his garage and noticed that an unknown suspect, without his effective consent, had entered his garage through an unlocked side door. While inside the unknown suspect took a revolver, a generator, a weed eater, and a reciprocating saw. The resident decided

at that point he would secure the garage and report the offense the following morning. The next morning at approximately 0720 hours, the resident found his garage door open and discovered that one of his generators had been removed with his hand truck and both items were found behind the house. While the resident was searching the rest of his property, a gray Dodge pickup was seen outside his front gate which sped away at a high rate of speed. A Hollywood Park officer checked the area and no vehicles matching the description were found. The officer gathered evidence at the scene and submitted it to CID.

Offense: Fraud

Date: 05.08.15

Time: 1100 hours

Location: 13600 blk Treasure Trail

An officer was contacted on the city cell phone by a resident that wanted to report a fraud. On approximately 04.04.15, the resident mailed out a check to the IRS from his residence. The resident said the check never made it to the IRS and approximately three weeks later on 04.30.15; checks began clearing his bank account that he did not write. In total 8 checks cleared his account for a large amount of money. The resident was told by the fraud department at the bank that the checks appeared to be counterfeit and had been written out by an individual named XXXX and cashed at a USAA bank branch. The officer asked the resident if he could print out copies of the checks from his account and he said the bank had closed the account and he could no longer access it. The resident was asked to stop by the Hill Country Village city hall to fill out a prosecution intent form and victim identification card. The resident agreed to take care of this at his earliest opportunity. The officer resumed patrol.
