Offense: Criminal Mischief

Date: 12.08.14

Time: 1329 hours

Location: 14100 blk San Pedro

An officer was dispatched to a local business for a crash involving a wheelchair. The officer arrived and contacted the female caller. She reported a male driving a black truck had struck her wheelchair as she was crossing the exit driveway on the sidewalk. She was unable to provide any other info on the vehicle since it did not stop after striking her. Her wheelchairs wheel was damaged but she was not injured. It is unknown if the driver was aware he had struck the wheelchair.

Offense: Crash

Date: 12.10.14

Time: 2342 hours

Location: 300 blk Tower Drive

A resident called to report a crash. The officer arrived and found the car had rolled over and was upside-down. Contact was made with the driver who was pinned inside the vehicle by a taunt seatbelt. The female was unable to state how the accident occurred. The investigation suggests the female was initially traveling north on Tower Drive. There was a light mist of rain and the asphalt surface was slightly wet from the mist. The final resting position of the car was approximately 300 feet north of the Tower Drive/Limestone Creek intersection. The speed limit for Tower Drive is clearly posted at 30 mph. It is the officer's opinion that the female lost control of the vehicle on the curve due to excessive speed. The vehicle traveled across the southbound lane, leaving the roadway. Approximately 40 feet of tire markings in the soft grass align with the final resting position of the vehicle. The markings show where the car struck a brick pillar, leaving a taillight on the ground and continued north striking several more pillars

and the wrought iron fence. A portion of the undercarriage of the car caught the concrete base of a pillar causing the car to flip over onto the hood, coming to its final resting position. The female was transported by EMS to a local hospital.

Offense: Burglary of a Building

Date: 12.11.14

Time: 0148 hours

Location: 100 blk Hill Country Lane

At 0148 an officer received a cellular phone call from a resident. The resident reported he and his son had just interrupted a burglary of his shed. He gave the officer a vehicle description so the officer searched the area for the suspect vehicle. The officer did not find the vehicle and proceeded to the resident's house. He reported his son had woken him up out of bed when his son saw a stranger on their property. The resident and his son went outside and went to the suspect's vehicle which was parked in the driveway. The resident was hoping he would find keys in the ignition so he could take them to keep the suspect from fleeing. There were no keys in the ignition because the ignition had been popped out as if the vehicle was stolen. The resident and his son proceeded around the house toward the shed in the backyard. They met face to face with the suspect who was carrying a chainsaw and a nail gun. The resident asked the suspect what he was doing on his property. The suspect replied with "I'm sorry man" and put the tools on the ground. The suspect then said "I'm sorry man, this is all I got". The resident told the suspect he was calling the police. The suspect then said "please don't". The suspect then went to his vehicle and fled on Hill Country Lane toward Tower Drive. The vehicle was described as a Maroon GMC extended cab truck with maroon windshield wipers. The suspect was described as a male with an unshaven face, 50-60 years of age, 6'00 and 180 pounds. The resident did not recognize the suspect as anyone he knew. The resident and the officer went to the shed to complete the report. It appears the suspect gained entry into the locked shed by prying it open with an unknown tool. Evidence was collected at the scene. This case is under investigation.

Location: 15700 blk San Pedro

A business owner called the city cell phone to report two males that had come into his store stating they needed access to the attic because they were doing electrical work on the property. The owner refused them access and called police. The officer made contact with the two males in question who were sitting in an electrical truck. They were able to show a work order from the property owner requesting repairs on the exterior lights. In order to gain access to all of the wiring for the lights they needed to enter some of the businesses. Both men were checked on the computer system and their returns came back clear. The owner was informed of the work order and was told that the males were legitimate.
